

Speld Qld has been supporting people with learning difficulties across the state for over 50 years, providing educational advice, psychoeducational assessment, specialist teaching, assistive technology consultations, professional development, workshops, a library, and more. The number of Queenslanders who could benefit from Speld Qld services has always exceeded our capacity to meet their needs, but this past year has seen major progress in resolving this problem. I will leave it to our Chief Executive Officer (CEO) David Oliver, to document the new staff and demographics that Speld Qld can now offer. The huge reduction in assessment wait times, growth in Sounds-Write training, and push to provide improved coverage of service in regional and remote areas, are facts of significant pride for the Management Committee and entire Speld Qld team.



On the subject of the Management Committee, there has been continued evolution which has brought new skills and energy to the table. As a volunteer body that requires both considerable time and personal responsibility, it is not always an easy ask. I would like to thank both Gavin Bryce from the Qld Academy For Creative Industries and Kirrily Boulton from Endeavour Foundation, who both concluded their tenure following the 2022 AGM. Kirrily served for a number of years on the committee and contributed substantially to the extensive project to update the Speld Qld constitution which meant we started the year with a solid achievement.

Over the course of the year the Management Committee has added significant expertise with Susan Lindsay, Executive Director with Presbyterian and Methodist Schools Association (PMSA), Leanda Norman, the Head of Curriculum at Algester State School, and Andrew Bridge, Managing Director of Audacity Consulting. At the 2023 AGM we farewelled Joanne Nyland from Griffith University who has served as the Management Committee Secretary and been a powerful colleague for positive change as Speld Qld has grown.

Speld Qld CEO's Reflection



David Oliver Chief Executive Officer

Like all individuals, communities, and organisations, the 2023 financial year has seen us operate with more freedom after three years of Covid restrictions and shutdowns. The Speld Qld team has consistently responded to the challenges the last few years have placed upon them and as always, continue to deliver high-quality services and support that enrich the learning outcomes for Queenslanders experiencing learning difficulties. Our team of experienced psychologists, educators, and advisors remain focused on the needs of individuals with specific learning difficulties and those who teach and care for them.

Our financial performance reflected the underlying strength and maturity of our business units. It is critical for us to be financially strong and self-sustaining, enabling us to deliver the support our current and future clients need.

• As presented in our financial statements, Speld Qld returned a modest surplus in the 2023 financial year, while maintaining a strong balance sheet that will provide confidence to our clients and staff of our long-term viability.

Our various business units experienced unprecedented growth.

- In the 12 months to 30 June 2023, we received close to 1,900 assessment applications, a 17% increase on the previous year. This saw an equivalent percentage increase in the number of assessments conducted. We met this increase demand by employing 8 new psychologists and expanding our business operations by opening new clinics in Benowa (Gold Coast), Dayboro (Moreton Bay), and most recently at Bundaberg.
- There were 33 Sounds-Write (SW) four-day workshops held in this financial year compared to 19 in the previous financial year. This was accomplished by an additional staff member qualifying as a SW trainer.
- Our library service, available to all financial members, loaned over 7,200 library resources during the year including non-fiction and fiction books, and educational games.

The Education and Advisory team, which includes highly experienced teachers and a speech pathologist, field over 1,300 enquiries a month. Besides providing specialist support and advice to teachers, other professionals, clients, and their carers, they also schedule the assessments and organise PDs and workshops.

Certain areas of our operation would not have the coverage needed if it were not for the ongoing support of Education Queensland. Our partnership is crucial to ensuring the continued advancement of education and general welfare for individuals with specific learning difficulties. This year we have been granted additional funding which is focused on supporting regional and remote areas of Queensland, and the new Kindy Inclusion Program. We have employed specialists in these areas and both programs are proving to be extremely well received. We are also extremely grateful to our generous sponsors and supporters.

We know that based on recently released NAPLAN data, one in three school students throughout Australia are not meeting minimum numeracy and literacy expectations, and one in ten are so far behind they need additional support.

In Queensland, almost two in five students are failing to meet new national standards for reading, writing and maths, the worst outcome of any mainland state. As stated in the Brisbane Times (Caldwell, 2023), 38.1% of students are falling into the "needs additional support" or "developing" categories, compared with the national average of 32.8%. 
Clearly there is still much for us to do, but we are here for all those who need our support.


Speld Qld Membership


This year we saw a rise in membership from 1,957 to 2,215. This is a 12% growth primarily reflecting the increase in psychoeducational assessments being conducted. The number of school and corporate memberships has also increased as Speld Qld continues to deliver professional development across education sectors, along with supporting workplaces. Table 1 outlines Speld Qld Membership categories.

Advisory and Education Services

Support, information and advice is offered to parents, teachers, and other professionals via our free telephone advisory line. Our Advisory and Education team are available Monday to Friday 8:00am - 4:00pm. Enquiries outside these hours are via email or voice mail with a response time of the next working day.

Initial contact for an assessment is via email. This explains the greater proportion of emails reported compared to telephone enquiries shown in Figure 1. Overall, the Advisory and Education Service requests have more than doubled this year, with an average of 1,300 enquiries per month. July, October, and March received the highest number of enquiries, which coincides with the timing of parent teacher interviews, semester reports, and enquiries regarding accommodations for ATAR exams. Many phone calls from parents at this time begin with, "I've just had a meeting with my child's teacher who suggested we contact Speld...."





Of the people who contact the Advisory Service, 43% request general advice and information, and 38% require assessment information.

This year 5% of callers required assistance from the Specialist Teacher Service, 6% sought information regarding Workshops and Seminars, and 3% of enquiries were for Speld library resources. Family members were 49% of all callers to the Advisory Service. Teachers were 26% of callers. This is an increase due to interest in attending workshops and training as well as requesting resources and information to support specific students.

Thirteen percent of callers were adults enquiring about assessments for themselves and looking for information to share with their employer. This reflects a growing awareness in the workplace of the need to support employees with learning difficulties.






Assessment Service

Over this period there were 1,872 applications for assessment with 1,238 conducted. As seen in Figure 1 below, there was significant correlation between assessment applications and bookings each month following the pattern of the school year. Our team of psychologists conduct assessments at our Brisbane, Dayboro, Benowa and Bundaberg offices.

Our Dayboro clinic has assessments scheduled every weekday for months in advance. The Bundaberg clinic has been operating each Monday since mid-February 2023, and is already booked into 2024. The clinic in Benowa services the Gold Coast region and has been in operation since April 2023. Interest in assessments for this clinic are strong.


As in previous years, we have conducted online assessments for clients who cannot travel and we regularly schedule visits to schools in regional towns. Speld Qld psychologists have also been able to conduct 29 subsidised assessments thanks to our generous supporters.






Assessment Service

Specialist Teacher Service

The Specialist Teacher Service offered by Speld Qld received an average of 80 requests for support each month for the past 12 months, an increase of 25% on the previous 2021/22 period. Data is collected from the Online Specialist Teacher Directory and does not include the additional enquiries received via email and phone each week.

There are currently 61 specialist teachers listed in our directory, the majority of which are located in Brisbane and the surrounding suburbs. New teachers are continuously sought and recruited for the service and, of course, high quality, online tuition is always offered to families in the absence of locally available teachers/tutors.

Focus in 2023 continues to be developing greater communication and collaboration amongst the specialist teacher network, and to automate communications with teachers and families as much as possible to reduce wait times and increase access. Monthly "Sip and Share" meetings are conducted via Zoom to discuss pedagogical choices, latest research developments and some aspects of business operations to ensure that Speld Qld specialist teachers are always using best practices with their students.

The Specialist Teacher Coordinator continues to seek more streamlined systems of tracking student and member engagement. Improvements being made in our data capture systems will provide better insight into how we can improve services to families and teachers.



Assistive Technology (AT) Service

There continued to be strong demand over the past 12 months for our Assistive Technology (AT) Service. Sessions were conducted throughout Queensland either face-to-face or online. We conducted 34 one-to-one sessions with students and their families and 5 Professional Development (PD) sessions. These sessions contributed to establishing relationships with families, schools and allied health professionals from Autism Queensland and OCC Therapy. Sessions have included workshops to educational staff in Redland Bay, Proserpine, Airlie Beach and Maroochydore, as well as individual consultations with families throughout Queensland.

Sessions were also requested by students, families, and schools wanting to increase their capacity with AT for the purpose of gaining documentation and approval from AARA for AT provisions to be accessed for external ATAR assessment.

Adult learners also sought advice on AT with 2 individual sessions conducted. Phone and/or email consultations, providing advice on available technology increased with 165 email, and over 120 phone enquiries.





Sounds-Write Program





Throughout 2022 and 2023, Speld Qld has hosted comprehensive four-day Sounds-Write workshops in various locations across Brisbane and the state. This training course has an excellent reputation as an evidence-based and highly effective linguistic phonics program. The aim of these workshops is to equip educators, tutors, speech therapists and parents, with a thorough system for effectively instructing reading and spelling.

The Sounds-Write training workshops follow a multisensory, step-by-step instructional approach for teaching reading and spelling. Throughout the workshops, attendees are informed about the historical development of the English written language and the importance of systematically teaching students how to decode this language. It provides a framework of conceptual knowledge for both the teacher and the student and a clear way to teach through errors.

All major lessons within the program are demonstrated, allowing participants to practice the lesson scripts and receive constructive feedback. The workshops also encompass conversations about assessment, the utilisation of decodable readers, and the program's adaptability. Sounds-Write is suitable for whole-class instruction from Prep to Year 2, with reinforcement in Year 3. Furthermore, it proves effective for intervening with students who are falling behind, and it is also applicable to teenagers and adult learners.

Sounds-Write face-to-face workshops in 2022 and 2023 have achieved maximum capacity attendance. During this period, Speld Qld facilitated 33 Sounds-Write workshops, including courses in Townsville, Cairns, Tinaroo, Rockhampton, Proserpine, Toowoomba, the Gold Coast, and various locations in Brisbane.

Sounds-Write Program

The majority of participants in these workshops comprise teachers, support staff, and speech pathologists from QLD State, Independent and Catholic primary schools. Attendees also encompass teachers from Special Schools and Secondary Schools, as well as parents of dyslexic children who seek to enhance their children's reading and spelling skills at home.

Sounds-Write remains a highly sought after workshop offered by Speld Qld, with all workshops for the remainder of 2023 booking quickly and numerous enquiries from around the state for future workshops. Speld Qld remains committed to delivering this in-demand training to all those dedicated to using evidence-based programs, ensuring optimal learning outcomes for Queensland students.

Workshops & Professional Development

There is continued high demand for quality workshops, with 44 workshops presented by speakers sourced nationally and internationally during this period, and attended by 1,913 people, as outlined in Table 1. Workshops were divided between online or in-person during this period with a number of regional visits.

Kindy Inclusion Program Overview

In November 2022, Speld Qld was successful in receiving a grant to became a provider for the Kindy Inclusion Service. The scope of the program is described by the Queensland Department of Education as aiming to enhance the participation, inclusion, and learning and development outcomes of kindergarten children with additional needs, within their educational setting.

All support within this initiative, provided by Speld Qld Education Advisors and Speech Pathologists, is fully funded by the Queensland Government and accessible to all Queensland approved kindergarten services.



Key Objectives of the Speld Qld Kindy Inclusion Service

- To increase the confidence, knowledge, and skills of educators in creating an inclusive learning environment for children with a potential learning disorder.
- To maximise student engagement in learning, experience learning success and progress during the kindergarten year.
- To provide practical support and information to educators about appropriate educational adjustments and experiences for children with a language or potential learning disorder.
- To be a relevant, reputable, and accessible source of current information and research in respect to children with a potential learning disorder, and translating this into best practice and support for educators.

Delivery Mode

Given the scope of this project is Queensland wide, the delivery model includes:

- An advisory service (phone/email) with Education Advisors and Speech Pathologists.
- A suite of professional development workshops (on-site delivery or online).
- Targeted support.
- Service visits.
- Professional Library and Children's Literature Library.
- Regional visits for rural services.

Kindy Inclusion

For the majority of the first six months of 2023, the Kindy Inclusion Service program was in the pre-launch phase of the initiative. During this time, to prepare for delivery, the Speld Kindy team has focused on the following areas:

- Organisational protocols, procedures, and staffing.
- Product development, review, and feedback cycle.
- Engaging with kindergartens for observational visits and discussions.
- Presenting workshops to four selected kindergarten services in a trial phase.

Four of the kindergartens in the pre-launch 'piloting' phase engaged with our service for a site visit and then participated in either one or two workshop sessions. Engaging with these services was critical to establish connections with the community, test procedures for efficiency, ensure our modes of support and content delivery met the needs of 'on the floor' practitioners, and allowed an avenue for specific feedback to our team for service improvement. The feedback from the kindergartens in the pre-launch phase was extremely positive with all participants reporting a significant increase in their knowledge of learning disabilities and in their confidence to give practical, inclusive support to the children in their care.

On June 8th, 2023, the Kindy Inclusion Service was officially launched by the Queensland Government. The Speld Qld Kindy team presented two online sessions that were accessible to all kindergartens in Queensland. Service provisions were outlined, and information provided about support pathways. By June 30th, 2023, thirty-one kindergartens had registered with the Speld Qld Kindy Inclusion Service and plans to support these services were initiated.

Looking ahead, the Speld Qld Kindy Inclusion Service aims to continue to connect with kindergartens across Queensland and provide universal and targeted support for educators. The Speld Qld Kindy team has a particular commitment to regional and remote kindergarten services and seeks to travel in the upcoming year to provide face-to-face support as needed.



Library Service

The Speld Qld library stocks a range of phonics readers from beginner to teens and adults, which continue to be popular. Phonics readers can be borrowed in a set with a workbook consisting of multisensory activities linked to the series of books.

Borrowing levels fluctuated throughout the period with a peak of 823 resources borrowed in August 2022. We had 7,252 resources borrowed from July 2022 to June 2023, which is 1,252 more than the previous period.


